"Have Ye Not Read?"

Christian educators need to understand how to provide explicit instruction in the classroom that will promote both normalization of brain pathways for reading and continuity with clinical intervention when needed. Today, we can literally watch the brain reading, the exact pathways revealed. Not only science, but also history testifies of the high road to reading instruction – from Noah Webster to Samuel Orton to Stanisas DeHaene. In the Scripture, Jesus often asked, "Have ye not read?" Yet today only one third of students in our country are proficient readers. Why? Is it the students? The teachers? Both? In this workshop, we will explore the reading disorder often diagnosed as dyslexia – its prevalence, myths, identification, intervention, and comorbidities. Scriptural, evidence-based classroom instruction will be emphasized because the way we teach determines the brain pathway development in our students.

Having a child with intellectual and developmental disabilities can be challenging. The session will also discuss how to have a successful transition from school-age to adulthood.
